As a cradle Catholic who has been active in her faith throughout her lifetime, Carol Adams believes all parishioners need to contribute to the Church and parish life.

Carol was born in Remsen, Iowa, but moved to Weiser in 1969 with her husband, Bud. They have five children and have been married 64 years. "I strongly believe in home as the learning place for children for respect and love of God," she said.

For 13 years, even though she served as a deputy county clerk for Washington and Payette counties and as a presentence investigator for the Idaho State Department of Corrections, she still found time to volunteer as parish secretary for St. Agnes. She continues to volunteer as a lay eucharistic minister, bringing communion to shut-ins, hospitals and nursing homes.

In 2015, the Idaho Catholic Council of Women named her Woman of the Year for her years of service to the Church and council.
